Biology Investigations at The Cawthron Aquaculture Facility

Recently our Year 13 Biology students were privileged to attend two days of intensive scientific research at the Cawthron Aquaculture facility at The Glen.

Starting with an introduction to Spat NZ's research and development, students went on to design and carry out their own individual experiments into green shell mussels. We were delighted to be able to be given permission to take this picture of some of the students in this very secure and highly secret area which is usually off limits for snap shots!!



This year we were tortunate enough to have a guest scientist, Steve Cutler (Marine Studies Centre, Otago University). Steve was great with our students and his wealth of experience was greatly appreciated. The programme COordinated by Glenis Paul Studies (Marine Centre Otago University). Rick Field (Environmental Educator, the Nelson) was presenter/educator who was knowledgeable assisted students with many technical aspects of their investigations.

The students got thoroughly engrossed in their experimental work and really pushed themselves in their critical thinking skills. This experience stimulates their interest in scientific investigations and can influence and affirm their future career aspirations.

We are able to use the laboratories courtesy of Mark Burdon of NMIT who also supports the programme. Many thanks to these people and Institutions. A particular thanks to Karen Goodger from The Cawthron who has enabled workshops to happen for Secondary schools in the region.

Live Reporting at NCG

This year at NCG all teaching staff are using live reporting. This means that for all classes, students and their whānau will be able to see comments related to current assessments in the portal as soon as the marking and moderation process have been completed.

Students will receive personalised and up-to-date feedback in the published comments. Students will still receive a minimum of two report comments per course for the year.

Whānau will receive an alert via email each time a new result is posted in the portal, some of which will have comments. Our aim is to also PDF and email any comments home during Term 4.

Junior achievement can be indicated on reports by one of two methods:


1. Assessment against Curriculum Levels:



The diagram to the left indicates the curriculum level typically expected at each year level. At each year level, students may be working at different curriculum levels. These levels have been further sub-divided to give an indication of student progress against each level as follows:

- **B** (Beginning) indicates your daughter has just started demonstrating learning at this level
- P (Progressing) indicates your daughter is typically learning at this level
- A (Acquired) indicates your daughter is achieving consistently at this level

Artificial Intelligence Tools

Artificial intelligence (AI) tools can transform the way students learn. Some of the popular AI tools that students may be using include ChatGPT, My AI on Snapchat and QuillBot. While these AI tools can provide helpful insights and be used to generate text, it's important to remember that they should only be used as a supplementary tool to support and enhance learning. They are not a replacement for a teacher or independent student research.





Students also need to know that they cannot copy content generated by AI tools and claim it as their own. They should always use their own words and ideas when creating their work. AI tools cannot be used as a primary source of data or referenced as a source of information in their work. While these tools can be beneficial, they are not perfect. The responses they generate are based on the input they receive, and they can sometimes generate inaccurate or misleading information. Students should use their critical thinking skills and fact-check any information they receive from these tools to ensure its accuracy.

A good rule of thumb is that if a teacher won't do it then you shouldn't use AI to do it. For example, a teacher wouldn't rephase a section of work, a teacher wouldn't rewrite a piece of work to reduce the word count and a teacher wouldn't allow you to write down the answer they give you to a question and then submit it in for marking. Teachers have tools available to them to help detect if AI tools have been used. If a piece of work is found to contain AI generated text, this will be deemed as plagiarism and in accordance with NZQA regulations, will be awarded a grade of Not Achieved. If this happens parents will be notified.



Al tools can be a valuable resource for students, but they should be used responsibly and in conjunction with other resources. Please discuss these tools with your child and reassure them that they are allowed to use the tools to supplement their learning but remind them to use their own words and ideas when creating their work.


Pink Shirt Day & Bullying-Free NZ Week



Attendance

Unplanned absence eg sick, funeral

If your daughter is unable to go to school the parent/caregiver must email absences@ncg.school.nz or phone the school (03 548 3104 - press option 1) giving your name, ārahi group and reason for the absence before 9am on the day of the absence, or prior to this day if possible.

Appointments during school hours

If it's not possible to make an appointment outside of school hours then you need to either email

absences, phone or organise your child to bring in a note or appointment card. Students need to come to the Student Office to receive a yellow permission slip and to sign out <u>before leaving</u> for their appointment. On return to school, students sign back in at the Student Office.

Intended absence of 1 day or more

For school trips/events students need to collect an Intended Absence form from the Student Office. The form is used to record assessment negotiations eg negotiated due dates for

assessments or altered assessment time. For intended absence of 1 day or more (eg Holiday, University Open Days, representing sporting fixtures etc)

parents/caregivers' need to email the Acting Principal (heather.mcewen@ncg.school.nz) as soon as possible. Parent/Caregiver will receive a response advising code for absence and to collect an Intended Absence form from the Student Office. For Seniors this coding is very important as it can affect a student's right to an extension for an assessment.



Gateway News

Term two has started with much anticipation and excitement as our Gateway students embark on their first days at work experience. We are so proud of our students taking up the personal challenge of working with our local supporting businesses, meeting new individuals, and learning about the workplace procedures and processes to follow. The students have learnt so much already, not only about their workplaces, but also about themselves. Students are beginning to acknowledge their strength of self and are developing a sense of pride. Often the hardest part of the Gateway programme is the first days of work experience. Debbie and I are very impressed with the way the students have been managing this with integrity, maturity, and poise. Read on to hear what some of the students have to say about their first day at work experience......

"I had a tour of the clinic and a health and safety induction. I watched a cat's abscess get cleaned and a dog get spayed. I learnt that the anesthesia used can affect a dog's heartbeat, and the vet nurses may need to use oxygen to help the dog through the operation. I learnt how to read a monitor that records the animals' heart rate and oxygen supply. Finally, I watched a dog get 4 teeth pulled out..."

"I help the Featherweights put their boxing gloves on, get in the correct positions for certain moves, I hold the hand pad for them to punch and offer words of encouragement...I am looking forward to the Police Station visit!"

"We stocked food items, built cat scratches for display, rotated and changed the layout of baby items, checked expiry dates for baby food and animal food, learnt how to drive the crate lift and sorted new stock...I am so happy and excited for next time"

"I was given my name badge, a hairnet, apron and cooker key. I was greeted by Adrian and all of the staff in the Bakery. Since the deli is connected to the bakery, I introduced myself to the staff there also. I am looking forward to learning more about the bakery and deli, and meeting more of the staff. I wonder about the bakery staff's career journey up until this point and what made them want to pursue this career pathway"

"I met Mandy and Jess who were working in the office then I was dragged outside by the children to play tag and football. I helped with wash cloths and cleaning up after morning tea, then Maree took me though emergency procedures and health and safety. I feel euphoric! My first day couldn't have gone better. I feel confident and happy in my work placement."

Introducing:

Boh Sanders

What is your first memory of being on a boat or on the ocean?

When I was 6 or 7 on our family holiday, my Dad took me fishing on his brothers small Fryan out of Oakura Beach. I think I only ended up catching one tiny snapper.

What age were you when you decided that you wanted to pursue a Career / life on the ocean?

I was 11. I decided that just after I completed my Level 1 learn to sail course.



What interests you the most about:

Sailing — it can be really interesting and there are always challenges to overcome with it. I also like the social aspect of it.

Boats — I like boats because you can sail on them, and they get you on the ocean. I also think it is really cool the way they are made and how it effects their performance.

The Ocean — it is beautiful to me and it can bring so many experiences. It is also significant to my background and who I am as a person as it has always brought so much happiness to my life. It is also home to an awesome ecosystem which I find very interesting.

What is the name of the business you are completing Gateway work experience with and the people you are working with?

I am working with Peter Murton at Murtons Timbercraft.

When do you go there and for how long?

I go there every Wednesday from 10 am until 2 pm.

What tasks have you completed there so far?

I have started the process of making wooden serving platters. This involves taking different types of timber with different colours and grains, and gluing them together to make larger wooden blocks. These are cut into, curved and glued together again to make an interesting pattern of the timer lined together asymmetrically. I have also started on the restoration of an old X Class Sailing Dingy. I am removing the old screws, nails and old supporting structures, and cutting out new ones on the bandsaw to replace them.

What have you learnt so far?

The effect that many chemicals and woods often used in boat building and carpentry have on your health when not following the correct health and safety procedures. I have also learnt about health and safety with woodworking as well as how to use some machinery and different tools. I have learnt about sustainability practices in woodwork, the different qualities, and characteristics of different types of wood, and what they are best suited for, specifically in the boatmaking industry.

What other opportunities have you pursued in sailing throughout your adolescence?

I have sailed on the R. Tucker Thompson (a tall ship in the Bay of Islands) and was a volunteer on it over the summer. I have been on a RNZYS Elliot 7 training week twice up at Kawau Island and have been on a youth leadership voyage on The Lion New Zealand. I have just returned from a week with Blake Inspire for Sailors which was abord the Steinlager 2. I am going on the Spirit of New Zealand Youth Development Voyage at the end of May. I also participate in many club and area regattas in Northland and am in the Nelson College for Girls Sailing Team.

What are your next steps for you along this pathway of interest?

I will be completing the Day Skipper course through the Gateway programme this year and next year I plan either to complete the Superyacht Crew course at NMIT or start my Deckhand Certificate.

What is Gateway providing you with this year at NCG?

It is providing the opportunity to work with and learn from a highly skilled and experienced boatmaker, allowing me to develop my skills and expert knowledge within the industry. Gateway also provides the chance to gain some industry specific qualifications such as Comprehensive Workplace First Aid, Workplace Health and Safety, and my Day Skippers Certification. It is also supporting me in finding out more about various career opportunities and pathways in the maritime industry.

ARE YOU INTERESTED IN HOSTING AN INTERNATIONAL STUDENT?

Nelson College for Girls is taking expressions of interest from families who wish to host an international student. Students need to be in a safe and caring environment so that they will feel at home and be part of the family. This will help them integrate into everyday home life which is extremely important to their wellbeing. We have international students seeking both long-term and short-term placements.

Host families will be paid a remuneration for this role and receive ongoing support from the International Department throughout the duration of your student's stay. As a host you would be expected to provide the following:

- Own room with comfortable bed, desk, and chair
- Good lighting and heating available in their room
- Enough drawer/wardrobe space for belongings
- Access to clean toilet and bathroom
- Access to laundry facilities
- Three nutritious meals per day
- Access to Internet

Police vetting will be carried out for all family members over the age of 18 living in the home and we will do a home visit and meet with you before placing any students.






